CHAPLAIN'S CORNER

But when the disciples saw him walking on the sea, they were terrified, saying, "It is a ghost!" And they cried out in fear. But immediately Jesus spoke to them and said, "Take heart, it is I; do not be afraid."

Matthew 14:26-27

It's always a surprise when you're waiting for answers in hospital. "When will I have the surgery?" "Are the test results ready yet" or "will the doctor see me today?" Sometimes, the surprise is unpleasant. For example, test results reveal to the care team that you need surgery immediately. But, you're only being informed of it as you're wheeled down to the operating room! Sometimes, it's more palatable: "You're being transferred to City Hospital this afternoon to begin physio and rehabilitation, so we can get you home." Whatever the answer is at the bedside, it al-

ways seems to surprise us; either pleasantly or unpleasantly.

It was no surprise that Jesus had the disciples get into their boat, and, that he'd meet them on the other side. It probably wasn't a surprise that the wind picked up that evening on the water and made the waves crash against the boat. These were experienced fishermen on the sea. They would have sur-

veyed the wind, the weather and the waves, determining it was safe to set out. The surprise was a strong and intense storm, which came out of nowhere; its sheer power frightened these experienced sailors something awful!

So frightened and fearful were they, our Lord appeared unrecognizable as He walked towards them in the middle of the storm. Long forgotten were the miracles the Son of God performed in front of them. It

should have been second nature for them to recognize the Messiah walking on the water. "No big deal" we could imagine them saying, "for our Teacher." But, fear and fright have a way of informing us that all will not be well.

We often do not recognize Christ walking with us and towards us when we are in crisis. The suffering and pain is consuming. The fear about what the future now holds becomes impossible to shake. Like the disciples, it's easier to believe a ghost, apparition or some other disturbing force is seeking us out, to finish us off. We forget that in such perilous moments, Jesus is seeking us out, calming the storm which may still be quite consuming, but, becoming more manageable as we hear Him say to us as He said to the disciples, "take heart, it is I; do not be afraid."

Oftentimes, a hospital visit from LuMinHoS reminds patients that Jesus is here! In this passage, not only does Jesus tell the disciples to take heart, Peter calls out to Jesus, "Lord, save me" and "Jesus immediately reached out his hand [...]" (verse 31). Jesus continues to reach out his hand to us, in any type and in any time of trouble. We may

not always recognize when Jesus walks towards us, but time and again He reminds us to have faith. That, in the midst of our very personal and very difficult storms, despite its turbulence, God not only saves us in Christ, but brings us peace in the midst of our lived chaos. Jesus triumphed over the cross and grave. In faith, we shall triumph once more, too. Nothing can nor will ever separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord (Romans 8:39); in the unity of the healing Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

THE IMPORTANCE OF LUMINHOS VISITATIONS



Patients who have been visited by LuMinHoS know the importance

of such visits. While current definitions of a holistic approach to healthcare address only the physical, mental, and emotional well-being of a patient, a more complete picture of care includes tending to a patient's spiritual health as well. If a patient's physical, mental, and or emotional health is in distress in times of illness and trauma, it follows that the patient's spiritual health is likely in crisis, too. Or, at the very least, shaken.

Every week, I receive meaningful feedback from those I serve in hospital. Sharing some of those comments with you now is incredibly humbling for me. Yet, I am compelled to share them with you to show the Spirit-led care LuMinHoS provides in visiting. Unbeknownst at times to us who visit the sick, God uses us to tend to the suffering's mind, body, and spirit!

I hear often how I have a gentle and caring demeanour that can almost instantly put patients and family members at ease. "You have a way about you that is comforting and understanding [...] you have a gift for doing this kind of work. Not everyone can do it." It's so humbling to hear this. I am grateful. I am also grateful that God gives us all many and various gifts to do the work He calls us to do. None of us should ever discount the way we have been called.

I met a wheelchair bound patient who experiences a lot of muscle pain. And, due to their con-

dition, speaking is also a challenge. It can take the patient some time to say a complete sentence, which, I may have to ask the patient to repeat. In their speaking to me a few days ago, during a very deep conversation, the patient needed to utter something they felt was important. And, that was, "I trust you." More deep conversation followed.

Another patient, whom I journeyed with for months, will call from time to time to remind me how much they appreciated the visits, remembering the day I served them communion, something they had not been able to receive for some time due to their mobility and the pandemic. "You have literally changed my life."

I give thanks to God for the gift of caring for patients. I also give thanks for what I receive from patients, learning from them. I am certain former LuMinHoS visitors could affirm my words with their own experiences. In the coming weeks, I look forward to welcoming new and existing lay visitors who will accompany me in bringing the peace of Christ to the bedside. To you, the reader, thanks for your continued prayers and financial support.


Printing and postage costs for our Caregiver newsletter continue to increase.
